Presidents Letter

To All Idlewilders:

As I assume the duties and responsibilities of President of the Idlewild Community I recognize the major achievements of the past few years. The construction of the caretaker's house and the renovation of the preacher's cabin are major changes in our Community. While I do not see major capital projects such as those in our future we are faced with a major task that has been imposed on us by Mother Nature.



This year saw the least rainfall in many years in New Mexico. Without normal rainfall, fires erupted across the state, particularly around Los Alamos. The 230 cabins in Idlewild are at risk from a similar event. The La Nina condition off the coast of California is expected to persist through next summer bringing us another dry year in 2012 and with it another frightening fire season.

In light of the enhanced fire risk, my main interest in the next year is to establish a program of defensive and proactive measures to better protect Idlewild. Fire responders are limited in what they can do to extinguish a forest fire. Forest fires simply run out of fuel. In this Newsletter you will find several suggestions for our implementation that can minimize the danger of fire by limiting its access to fuel. To assist in accomplishing those suggestions I have scheduled a cleanup week, July 9th through July 16th, 2012. I encourage property owners to adopt as many of the fire prevention suggestions as possible prior to and during that week when help will be available. There will be more on this later.

There are proactive plans in the works as well. Discussions with the Colfax County and Eagle Nest (ENFD) fire departments are in progress. The goal of those discussions is to establish/install items that reduce response time to an event in Idlewild. The Idlewild Board is evaluating a program to install signage at our 23 intersections. Installation of the signs will enable the fire responders and EMS to more quickly reach their destination. Further, the ENFD has requested that in a 911 call we identify the zone (assigned by the ENFD) where the cabin is located. Plans are in progress to inform cabin owners of the zone where their cabin is located.

Longer term proactive measures are also being discussed, particularly water storage. To reduce the time and effort required to bring water to a fire in Idlewild we are asking Colfax County to consider storage in Idlewild. We have to get in line for funding but the need is great and the possible project is actively supported by all fire responders. A preliminary meeting is scheduled with the Colfax County Fire Marshall and the State Fire representative of our district during this winter to explore the possibility. I will keep everyone posted on progress.

I am confident that the dedication and enthusiasm of Idlewilders in supporting our normal activities such as Sunday Worship, maintenance of the roads, etc will extend to our common goal of better fire awareness and forest health. I am looking forward to this next year and all the challenges that it brings.

Fire Protection

FIVE STEPS FOR PROPERTY PROTECTION

Here are five steps for defense of property from fires recommended by the Eagle Nest Fire Chief and many other fire protection professionals. It may not be possible to comply 100% with all of them. The security of your property increases with the extent you are able to implement them.

1. Remove pine needles to a distance of 10-20 feet from your cabin on all sides.
2. Remove limbs on trees on your property up to 8-10 feet from the ground.
3. Store fire wood at least 30 feet from your cabin.
4. Remove trees that are closer to your cabin than 10 feet.
5. Thin trees on your property, remove dead trees, pick up slash and fallen limbs for disposal.

Forest Health and Safety

Two natural forces reached critical conditions during the past year, high winds in December 2010, and serious fire danger during the 2011 spring and summer due to droughty conditions. A sizable number of weaker large trees were blown down, and there was some damage to buildings. The threat of fire and the incidence of two giant forest fires in Arizona and New Mexico, not to mention hundreds of smaller wildfires in Texas and the Southwest, prompted renewed planning efforts in our committee.

The NM Forest Service estimates the number of trees that the Carson National Forest will support in a healthy defensible environment is about 40 per acre, or roughly 3 per J.W. Dickerson lot (25x100 ft). Therefore, making one's cabin more defensible makes the forest more robust. The number of buildings in our area is inconsistent with letting the forest build up in a totally natural fashion, as may be done in very large forest settings, such as Yellowstone National Park or the Taos Pueblo. In the large tracts, natural or controlled fires can be allowed to burn more naturally in order to renew the forest vegetation. Fire patrols, such as those sent frequently by the Taos Pueblo, have managed to take early action to extinguish burning snags before they can become larger problems.

In a visit with Eagle Nest VFD Chief Scott Gibson, I learned that in a wildfire situation in the IWCC area that threatens a number of homes, the fire crews will typically choose to defend and isolate the more defensible buildings first, as part of their overall strategy of avoiding larger fires. Property owners who have indefensible property create a more hazardous situation for the firefighters and the community, and if there is no life in danger, saving those properties is the riskier tactic. In many cases the success of fighting a fire demands that indefen-

sible properties be removed from the equation by letting them burn into a more controllable situation and therefore more quickly become less of a threat to the greater area. If a wildfire grows large enough, a strategy of containment usually evolves, when all structures inside the containment area are vulnerable.

Some items for future thought and planning:

- Some places on the IWCC roads are impassable by the large fire engine in Eagle Nest. Currently, the ENVFD will simply not go through those constrictions, and will need to string water lines around them if necessary. This uses up valuable time and may create a wildfire "containment" situation rather than just protecting individual properties.
- The IWCC still does not have the right sort of road and house markers. Chief Gibson pointed out that markers need to be reflective, large, and mounted at least 4 feet from the ground (above typical snow depth). It is imperative that the IWCC Board of Directors support a campaign of marking the roads uniformly and keep the pressure on citizens to clearly mark their house with large, reflective numbers well above snow level as part of their defensibility strategy. A fairly good inexpensive prototype for a durable road marker was erected several years ago by Bob and Ann Knupp at the intersection of Road 3 and SH127. The committee suggests that this is a place to start, and fancier road markers can come later. Chief Gibson gave us the name of a local company that can produce large reflective plastic road markers, which would also be a viable initial plan. It is **National Laser**, owned by Martin Sheriff. The end product is white letters on a red reflective field. Chief Gibson has further contact information. Other designs may also be competitive.

A visit with Gary Lawley, a veteran smoke jumper from Alaska, yielded the following information, in summary:

- Large fires in wind can leave us with only minutes to make our way to safety. A crowning forest fire in the wind can move at speeds on the order of 50 mph. Such a fire in Lakeview Pines could reach our area in less than 5 minutes. In certain situations, early evacuation based on the probable threat of such events, may be the more prudent course. That was exactly what was done before and during the 2011 wildfire in Bastrop, TX. Although more than 1600 homes were destroyed, only 2 lives were lost.
- Fighting wildfires has become a commercial business. With the concept of "containment," property owners will not be able to control the treatment of their holdings in a wildfire. First, people are evacuated, and the fire fighting crews do what they must to control the larger area, mostly at the fire's perimeter, where they can use large-scale methods more effectively.
- Looking around our neighborhood, Mr. Lawley noticed an abundance of ladder fuels; smaller trees nestled next to large trees; a lack of adequate road markers; narrow roads; impassable road sections; trees threatening power lines, and large numbers of indefensible dwellings.

There is a lot of forest safety work to do in the IWCC.

In August 2010, the remaining maps in the 2008 printed edition were turned over to Frank Dodge for distribution. In the spring of 2011, I received a request for maps from the new ENVFD Fire Chief, Scott Gibson, and he was able to obtain useful copies from Mr. Dodge. Chief Gibson would like to have more durable maps to carry into the field, and we are looking for ways to fulfill that request. Such maps could also be distributed to other emergency and public service personnel in the area.

The Map Committee has finished the bulk of canvassing deed changes from data supplied in 2010 by Colfax County. Drafts of the 2011 IWCC area and the J.W. Dickerson subdivision maps

should be printed, and I've pledged they could spare some company resources to travel to his engineering office in Fayetteville, Texas to assist.



able. Early evacuation is the only solution here. One begins to understand the power of such an incident and the larger strategy of containing wildfires, letting them exhaust the available fuel, and why there should be no civilians in photos like this one.

From a ground-based firefighter's point of view, this looks like a place to turn around and head back to safety. I can't imagine the heat for passengers in vehicles driving along this road, but it doesn't look surviv-


