To All Idlewilders:

Winter time is fading but still has some bite left. A series of storms from the west have provided necessary but limited moisture. Hopefully it will continue throughout the summer.

As I mentioned in a prior letter, forest cleanup is an ongoing activity. With the help of Colfax County we'll continue this summer with the simplest and most effective fire prevention activities—removing slash, dead trees, etc. A survey of the Idlewild database indicated that there are approximately 85 properties without a cabin. I'll renew my request that if you are one of those property owners, please consider allowing some cleanup to occur. These simple and easy items have the greatest benefit for fire protection. Cleanup has the potential to increase the value of the property and not the taxes.

We have a new commissioner representing us with the County Commission, Landon Newton. We'll ask him to visit us over the summer to get better acquainted. The agenda for Commission meetings is available on the County website, so we have the opportunity for input on issues that might affect us.

Late in 2012, Kit Carson was asked to delay their program to bring high-speed internet to many of the communities in the area, Idlewild included. The details of the requested delay are complicated and are associated with the operation of the internet and cable services that will follow the installation. Idlewild submitted comments on the issue and was helpful in defeating the effort to delay the program. We are scheduled for an electrical service and internet installation program in 2014.

This summer, Eagle Nest will again host the High Country Arts and Crafts Festival. Last summer's festival, under the direction of the Stickneys, with the support of the Eagle Nest Chamber of Commerce, was one of the most successful ever. It's scheduled for the last weekend in July, so mark your calendar to visit that weekend. You can attend the Idlewild Annual Meeting that same day.

Our community-wide fire protection efforts have raised our profile with Colfax County and other organizations that provide us with essential services. This summer I hope to provide Idlewilders with the opportunity to meet representatives of those services such as EMS, fire departments, etc. This outreach extends to the Taos Pueblo as

well, particularly for a long-term fire protection program.

Finally, there is an opportunity that we need to address as a community. I want to invite everyone to comment on the future use of the internet and email for the newsletter and other communications of interest. This is a generational as well as a cost-reduction issue. When I assess our situation I see a community moving forward on several fronts. This summer will see more progress.

July in the mountains is our respite; however, we do fill some of the days with activities that we love. Here are a few suggestions for an upcoming visit to the Enchanted Circle.

Angel Fire: In 2012, Angel Fire added the *Rocky Mountain Zipline Adventure Tour*, starting at the 10,600-foot elevation summit of the Angel Fire ski mountain. 

The views are spectacular! Just be sure to only take it in a four-wheel-drive vehicle, preferably not in your luxury SUV that says "4WD." Plus, it's an all-day trip, so pack food, water, and a jacket. But probably the best time of all is a game of *BINGO* at the *Red River Community Center* on the outdoor patio. The laughs, the wins, the losses, and the screams of "Blackout" will always be cherished moments!

Taos: Galleries galore and hidden gems. Taos can be revisited and a new adventure every trip. *New Wave Rafting* is our rafting company of choice. The guides are smart and interesting, as well as safe. Call ahead and ask questions—"How's the water running?" Some years, the "Taos Box" is doable by most ages; other years, it is for the experienced rafter only. <http://newwaverafighting.com>. While on the south end of Taos, be sure to visit *Rancho de Taos* and the *San Francisco de Asis Mission Church* built in 1772. When dining out in Taos, there are two "Gotta Haves"—*Taos Pizza Out Back* (TPOB) and *Orlando's*. We don't eat out often while in New Mexico because the fresh air makes even a sandwich taste better; but when we do, we are very specific about where and what we order. *TPOB* is the one guaranteed thing we do every trip to NM. TPOB is a colorful, quirky, home-owned pizza joint. From their perfect crust to the tremendous options, you can't go wrong! The slices are *enormous!* Be sure to order a salad (a small is plenty for two) served with their homemade pesto dressing ... and keep a little to dip your crust! Another all-time favorite is their Green Chili Posole—YUM! Or-



lando's patio is a casual and friendly place to enjoy the Christmas Tree Stacked Enchiladas; but don't miss out on their out-of-this-world Avocado Pie, a heavenly frozen treat. For an upscale food experience, the *Trading Post* in Rancho de Taos is fabulous! Ask for the chef's special and don't be surprised if it is fresh, flown-in-that-day seafood! An unexpected find last year was *Perree's Nursery*. Native plants and blooming beauties fill the many greenhouses! Well worth the winding roads west of the square!

Cimarron Canyon is the home of our very favorite hiking trail. *Clear Creek Trail* can be found at mile marker 292 in Cimarron Canyon (where the water flows through the log). The waterfalls are beautiful and it's easy enough for a beginner. Nearby is the "beaver dam," as we call it. You'll catch a few of us fly-fishing when allowed; sometimes it's closed due to fire danger. Please adhere to the rules and regulations. Parking passes are needed for any vehicle parked in Cimarron Canyon.

Eagle Nest: We have become lifetime friends with several of the locals. It is our hope that you will always consider giving Eagle Nest retailers and vendors your primary business. They are good people who care for our community during the many months we are not in Idlewild. *Shop Local First!* Did you know Eagle Nest is the home to the largest fireworks display in New Mexico? Every July 4th, we look forward to the parade and Firemen's BBQ. But our favorite is piling into the back of the vehicle with blankets pulled to our chins watching the fireworks over Ea-

gle Nest Lake from atop Idlewild. Truly a breathtaking treasure to the area. The *High Country Arts and Crafts Festival* held in late July is full of talented wares. Many of our Idlewilders volunteer their time and effort in making this event a success. Please show your appreciation for their love of the arts and Eagle Nest by visiting this event if you are in town. If you need a place to rest and enjoy a little people-watching, the boardwalk at the *Laguna Vista Saloon* is ideal! 

Idlewild Community Annual Meeting

July 29, 2012 President Paul Fahrenhold called the meeting to order with a welcome and passed out the agenda and minutes. Theo Houser opened the meeting with a prayer.

The guest speakers were Mike Berne, president of the Eagle Nest Chamber of Commerce, and Scott Gibson, Fire Chief of the Eagle Nest Volunteer Fire Department. Mr. Berne thanked the Idlewild volunteers for making the High Country Arts and Crafts Festival a successful event. He said that he is new to the area and owns the Great Escapes Motel. Chief Gibson entertained questions. He said that there have been very few lightning-strike fires, and encouraged the community to keep chipping slash.

After thanking the guests, President Fahrenhold expressed appreciation to the outgoing IWCC directors, Sue Dorr, Ann Matta, and Donna Porter, for their service to the community.

Report of the Nominating Committee



The Great Outdoors Camp would be a great activity for Idlewild kids and grand-kids. The GO Camp is a free morning (9:00 to noon) camp open to children ages 10–14. It is held at Eagle Nest Lake State Park and is usually scheduled during the last half of July each year. This will be our third year. In 2011 we registered 20 kids, in 2012 we had 60, and for 2013 our goal is to reach 60 to 80.

The current sponsors include The New Mexico Department of Game & Fish, New Mexico Parks Department, Eagle Nest Lake State Park, Eagle Nest Chamber of Commerce, and The Friends of Eagle Nest Lake & Cimarron Canyon State Parks. Other volunteers include The National Forest Service, Trout Unlimited, Gary Bowen as a historian, and various other individuals who have taught flint-knapping and more.
