Letter from the President

Greetings to everyone in Greater Idlewild

At the time of this letter, spring is beginning to arrive on the mountain. As in last spring, plentiful winter snow and probable spring snow showers will provide a great start to foliage, help the lake continue to rise, and enhance the view driving through Cimarron Canyon. Amazing how the forest can repair itself.

With warm weather comes outdoor activities. Please be careful with outdoor recreational fires. Residents can consult the Colfax County website for management details. Two near-misses in our area this winter prompt this request.

The state has done a good job on maintaining Highway 127 during

the winter. The district office hasn't determined if the proposed chip-seal process will occur. In general, all community roads appear to be in good shape for spring.

Residents will be walking community roads during good weather. Please be attentive to their presence during your driving. Also, the state has guidelines regarding ATV (state-defined as OHV) usage. Please review these rules and abide by their instructions. Kindly stay on the community roads and respect private property and driveways. A great rules guide is <http://www.wildlife.state.nm.us/ohv/>. Other New Mexico websites are available so you can register your ATV online.

A few questions about pet management have arisen. Colfax County does have pet regulations posted for review on its website. In general, owners should tether their pets or use some other direct-control method. Pets are a great addition to the community.

Spring is about to kick off, and summer promises to be enjoyable. Current and future improvements to the Community Center will make it a great place for social events. This newsletter will have the dates of scheduled events. One stated event will be the community's Annual Meeting, following the potluck lunch on July 26th. Please

Firewise Community Activity for 2019

Progress with our Firewise effort in 2019 was remarkably successful, due to a large number of participants, very fine vegetation removal and advisory work by the Caretaker, and better understanding of the various parameters for the annual data reports. The Firewise report is sent to a New Mexico liaison officer via an internet portal.

Many of our residents have scant knowledge of the four major risk mitigation standards that Firewise USA has established for (1) proximity areas cleared of combustibles, relative to a cabin or house on a lot, (2) quantity of vegetation units removed from each area, (3) out-of-pocket expenditures related to wildfire risk reduction, and (4) volunteer-hours of manual labor spent on the mitigation. A set of PDF pages showing the nature of the New Mexico

State portal has been developed to explain how your effort for the year is logged in a national unified system.

We will use our email server, MailChimp, and the Idlewild Facebook Group, to broadcast information related to these standards. The unified standard data form allows statistical analyses in the future across the USA that will measure the benefit of risk mitigation in the Wildland-Urban Interface. The IWCC Firewise management has been able, to date, to convert submitted data in all circumstances to the portal form. This is an indicator of an excellent effort for the portal design by Firewise USA. Our community has earned a new certificate announcing our success in 2019.

In the fall, the Firewise board agreed to an evaluation of wildfire

risk, as is required by our membership in Firewise USA. New Mexico forester Christopher Romo, who participated in the 2013 evaluation, was most generous in agreeing to do the job. Board member Joe Craig has been most helpful with the details. The evaluation day was defined as April 16, 2020, when the forest floor will be more navigable. Due to medical issues, I will not be present.

The risk evaluation by Chris Romo will provide data for changing our future efforts throughout the community to lower the probability of a serious fire event, and will also be an evaluation of how well we've done so far with our Firewise efforts.

MailChimp Email Server

As of March 29th, the number of subscribers to our MailChimp list has risen to 291. The group preferring to receive *Idle Times* by mail now numbers 168. To subscribe, go to the website www.idlewild-community.org and click on the green button next to "Join our Mailing List." This will open a window to MailChimp where you can enter your personal contact information. To avoid interlopers, the fields marked with an asterisk are mandatory. The email address you enter will be used by the Idlewild Community for community messages only, and will not be shared with outsiders. Either you or a resident administrator appointed by the Board of Directors can make changes to your subscription record. The administration would prefer that you continue to control the data in your own MailChimp record. MailChimp can be used for commercial communication, ads, etc., BUT IT WILL NOT BE USED AS

SUCH BY THE IWCC. The goal of having all residents in the community registered in MailChimp by 2020 was set by the Board of Directors several years ago.


My husband Bobby and I are able to spend our summers at the cabin, as we are both retired. My favorite spot is our little church, worshiping outdoors and leading the service when asked.
